Principles of Montessori Education

- The Prepared Environment
- Mixed-Age Classrooms
- Freedom with Limits
- Hands-On Learning
- Individualized Learning
- Respect for the Child
- Focus on Practical Life Skills
- Absence of Rewards and Punishments

The Areas of a Montessori Classroom

Practical Life - Activities surrounding care of the self and the environment, grace and courtesy, everyday living skills: hand transferring, scooping, pouring, using tongs, chopping, grating, squeezing


Language - phonetic focus, based on mastery learning, grouped purposefully

Math - rooted in concrete examples of quantities and concepts (squaring/cubing), based on mastery learning, specific progression

Sensorial - having to do with the senses: texture, form, color, shape, sound, taste, smell, size

Geography and Culture - Begins broad, then narrows; honors and places a strong emphasis on peace and intentionally focused on diversity; includes Science topics.
